#### At the December Town Council meeting:

A Public Hearing was held to consider several technical amendments to the Land Development Code. After discussion, these amendments were approved.

Highway 25 Corridor Improvements Project – The Town of Fletcher is starting the design process for the Highway 25 Corridor Improvements project. This is an initiative to make streetscape and other modifications along Highway 25 from Howard Gap Road to Cane Creek Road. The improvements are intended to give a sense that one is entering the downtown area of Fletcher. These changes are also intended to support development as a part of the Fletcher Town Center project. McGill Associates will be working on the final design for this project with construction planned to start in the summer of 2017. Funding for this project is coming from a grant from the North Carolina Department of Transportation and local appropriations from the Town.

Parks & Recreation Maintenance Building and Public Works Vehicle Shed - The Town has engaged Legerton Architecture to start the design process for a new Parks & Recreation Maintenance Building and Public Works Vehicle Shed. These buildings are needed to accommodate growth in activity in these departments. This is also needed in order to relocate structures to accommodate development in the Town Center area. It is anticipated that the design of the buildings will be complete by the spring of 2017 and the project let for bid by the fall of 2017. This project is being funded through the Town's Capital Improvement Plan.

It is monitored by surveillance cameras 24 hours a day. Or you may pay taxes online at our Town website www.fletchernc.org. You will need your roll number from your tax bill and your checking account number. The Town does not accept credit or debit cards.

Delinquent taxes are subject to garnishment of wages, attachment of bank accounts, levy on personal property and foreclosure proceedings.

#### TRASH TALK



Public Works employees will begin Christmas tree pick up on Tuesday, December 27th and continue every Monday through the month of January. Please call in a work order **prior** to Monday to request a pick up. All decorations must be removed as the tree will be

chipped. No artificial trees will be picked up or trees with root ball attached.

Please follow the guidelines for trash disposal using the roll-out cans! All trash <u>must be bagged</u> within the roll-out trash receptacle! This is to prevent trash from blowing out when the can is lifted into the truck. If Public Works employees discover the contents are not bagged, they will tag the can and not pick up the contents! **Do not leave bags of trash outside of the rolling carts or leave the carts in the roadway.** Public Works employees have encountered a continuing problem with residents leaving loose trash or additional bags or boxes of trash placed beside the rolling trash cans.

Bagged leaf pick up ended at the end of December. This department will not pick up leaves again until the first 2 Mondays in April—April 3rd and April 10th. If you must dispose of leaves, you may take them to the Henderson County transfer station on Stoney Mountain Road. There is a charge for disposal of leaves at that facility.

Fletcher was ranked the 2nd Safest Small town (7th safest overall) in North Carolina in *ValuePenguin's* latest Safest Places report! The city has moved up 7 ranks from ValuePenguin's 2015 analysis, and had the 2nd lowest rate of violent crime in the state, as well as a very low rate of property crime.

To rank these places, *ValuePenguin* analysts collected data from the FBI. The raw data included property crimes (burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson), and violent crimes (murder/manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) from all law enforcement agencies that chose to partake in the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting program.

The data was then standardized to reflect violent and property crimes per 100,000, to account for population, after which they aggregated a "crime score" by weighting violent crime at 80% and property crime at 20%. Though property crime is more prevalent, *ValuePenguin* analysts gave violent crime more significant weightage since violent crime tends to be more concerning to citizens. The crime score was finally adjusted for population size, giving more slack to larger cities, and ranked.

Fletcher's high ranking in the *ValuePenguin* study is a cause for celebration for our hard working police department for a job well done, and should serve as a barometer for residents, visitors and businesses who wish to understand the safety level of our community!
