At the May Town Council meeting:

Council members approved a resolution to sell surplus property and equipment at public auction on *govdeals.com*.

Members discussed amendments to the Parks & Recreation ordinances prohibiting drones and rockets at the Town parks. Tobacco products are now prohibited at the parks and signs will be posted.

Discussion was held about the current charges for use of facilities such as ballfields and the shelter at the Fletcher Community Park. Members approved changes to the fee schedule for the rental of these facilities. These changes will take effect July 1, 2017.

An agreement with First Tryon Advisors for assistance with building projects was approved. First Tryon will provide assistance with the financing process for the Parks & Recreation maintenance building and Public Works vehicle shed.

Fee Schedule Changes

At the May 2017 Town Council meeting, Council members approved a revised fee schedule for use of the facilities at the Fletcher Community Park.

These rates will be effective July 1, 2017.

Drop in Meeting for Highway 25 Corridor Improvements

June 14, 2017 at 4:30-6:30 p.m.

Following a 2014 study to determine feasibility for streetscape enhancements on the Highway 25 Corridor, the Town of Fletcher was awarded grant funding from NCDOT to construct improvements to sidewalks, landscaping, and street lighting, with some additional traffic calming measures. The project scope will be along Hendersonville Road (Hwy 25) from Cane Creek Road to Howard Gap Road. The Town will be hosting a public input meeting on Wednesday, June 14, 2017, at Fletcher Town Hall (300 Old Cane Creek Road) in the Multi-purpose room on the third floor. The meeting will be an informal "drop in" style meeting from 4:30-6:30 PM. You can come by anytime during this time window to view the design plans. Representatives from our consulting engineering firm, McGill Associates, as well as Town Staff, will be present to answer questions and receive any comments you may have regarding the project, which will hopefully begin construction later this year. TRASH TALK

Please follow the guidelines for trash disposal using the roll-out cans! All trash <u>must be bagged</u> within the roll-out trash receptacle! This is to prevent trash from blowing out when the can is lifted into the truck. If Public Works employees discover the contents are not bagged, they will tag the can and not pick up the contents! Do not leave bags of trash outside of the rolling carts or leave the carts in the roadway. Public Works employees have encountered a continuing problem with residents leaving loose trash or additional bags or boxes of trash placed beside the rolling trash cans. Due to recent high winds, employees have been physically laying the trash cans down to keep the wind from blowing them into the road. We ask that you write your address on the lid of your trash cart with an indelible marker to help you identify your cart.

You may now request a brush pickup online! Go to the Town website—-www.fletchernc.org—and you may access the link either from the "How do I" link at the top or through the Public Works department link. Brush pick up does start on Monday mornings (unless it is a holiday) and pick up requests must be in before Monday morning

We cannot chip lumber, railroad ties, building materials, telephone poles, or fence posts. Any brush piles containing these materials will be not be picked up. Please remember, brush pick-up is provided as a free service to our residents who are cleaning up the yard around their house. It is not to remove bushes, stumps, trees, and other debris resulting from plant removal, lot clearing, pool installation, construction, addition, new decks, etc. Removal of debris resulting from these activities should be arranged by the homeowner or the contractor at their expense.

Please be considerate of our employees and do not place any poison ivy or oak vines or briars in the brush piles. Severe allergic reactions are possible.

Did you know?

This department picked up 348 brush orders last month and chipped for 189 cubic yards of mulch.

We also handled 7 white good pick ups and picked up 160.16 tons of garbage in the town. And that required 336.77 gals of fuel to pick up!

The Town has an ordinance to prevent "illicit discharges" into the storm water systems. With the recent heavy rains, residents need to be aware that their actions can prevent storm water pollution and help to protect our beautiful mountain waterways!

Stormwater runoff is water from rain that flows across the landscape and instead of seeping into the ground. It flows into nearby streams or other waterways. As it flows, it has the potential of picking up and carrying many substances such as fertilizers and pesticides, oil, animal waste, grass clippings, and top soil.



Things you can do to prevent stormwater pollution:

- 1) Scoop up after your pet—even on the grass!
- 2) Make sure your septic system is in good condition.
- 3) Apply fertilizers and other garden products sparingly.
- 4) Plant, mulch, or contain any areas of bare soil.
- 5) Never dump anything down a storm drain! "Only rain down the drain!"
- 6) Make sure your business disposed of all liquids and solid waste appropriately.
