Responding to COVID-19 - April 15, 2020

Town of Fletcher COVID-19 Response

The Town of Fletcher was placed under a State of Emergency effective March 14, 2020 at 6:00 p.m. due to COVID-19. The Town entered into this declaration under the umbrella authority of Henderson County. Henderson County issued a "Supplemental Proclamation" to the March 14th order effective March 28, 2020 which it thought necessary "to slow the viral transmission in Henderson County as much as possible to protect the most vulnerable, and to prevent the local healthcare system from being overwhelmed." An Amended Supplemental Proclamation was made effective on March 31, 2020 to make certain previsions of the March 14th order identical to similar provisions of Governor Roy Cooper's Executive Order 121. The Town of Fletcher is operating under this Amended Order, which can be viewed at www.hendersoncountync.gov.

The Town of Fletcher is participating in weekly conference calls with the County and other municipal officials to help understand the constantly evolving situation and respond appropriately. A consistent message we are hearing from the County Health Department is to continue to follow public instructions to help limit the spread of the virus. They are also clear that the instructions they are following come from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), The NC Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), and our local Health Department. Our residents are cautioned that there is a lot of conflicting information on the Internet about this virus, so we would highly suggest using reliable and verifiable sources such as these noted above.

The Town has to this point been able to operate with only minimal impacts to services. Our Public Works Department has continued to provide all services that are normally available without interruption. There has been a noticeable increase in the volume of garbage that has been collected as well as a large uptick in the amount of brush collections. Our Police Department is continuing to operate at normal levels. They have adjusted their operating procedures to help limit direct contact with the public unless necessary.

Parks and Recreation has probably experienced the greatest disruption in services. All sports programming at Bill Moore Community Park has been suspended indefinitely. Kate's Park has been closed and at Bill Moore Community Park only the green spaces and trails are open. The Park has received a lot of traffic and consequently all park users are <u>strongly urged</u> to follow park guidelines as explained on the following page of this newsletter and as posted in the Park.

Planning & Zoning is operating at normal levels however the activity level has decreased with the state of the economy in flux, resulting in several projects being placed on hold. Staff is continuing to receive inquiries on new projects and they are issuing permits for ongoing projects as needed. Administrative Services is continuing to function at close to normal levels. Town Hall was closed to the general public on March 27th but the utilization of options to conduct certain types of business online has helped. Some administrative staff is at the Town Hall daily, with phone calls being answered at Town Hall.

We have three departments which have implemented teleworking with staff working some days in the office and some days from home. The staff in all departments have been asked to reduce expenditures where possible through the end of this fiscal year.

We thank you for following the stay-at-home order, the 6' social distancing, and using masks if you go out for essentials and encourage you to keep up the good work to help end the negative impacts of this virus soon.

NC Unemployment Claims

If you are laid off work temporarily or if your hours are reduced due to a business slowdown as a result of COVID-19, you may be able to receive unemployment benefits. State officials say the best way to file an unemployment claim is to go online to the NC Dept of Commerce Employment Security website at <u>www.des.nc.gov/</u> and create an account. After filing a claim, your last employer has 10 days to respond to DES. Your claim may be "pending", and no payment will be released during the 10 days. If there are no issues, it will take about 14 days from the time you file to receive payment according to DES. For more information, visit their website.

Federal Employment Insurance

The Division of Employment Security has received official guidance from the U.S. Department of Labor on how to implement the three unemployment programs of the federal CARES Act. We are working as quickly as possible to modify our systems to make sure people receive proper and accurate payments. If you are due any benefits prior to the full implementation of these programs, you will be paid retroactively.

DES intends to implement the programs in the following order.

1. Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation (FPUC): This program provides an additional \$600 in weekly unemployment insurance benefits to eligible claimants. We are currently testing our system for this program and anticipate making the first payments by April 17, 2020.

2. Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA): This program provides unemployment compensation for individuals not eligible for regular unemployment insurance or any extensions to unemployment insurance. This will provide benefits to eligible self-employed workers and independent contractors. We anticipate the system will be ready to accept claims for this assistance around April 25, 2020.

3. Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation (PEUC): This program provides up to 13 additional weeks of benefits for those who have exhausted their state unemployment benefits. A definitive timeline for completing system updates for this program is not yet available.

They will continue to provide updates about eligibility and how to apply for these benefits on their website.

Federal Government Stimulus Checks Are On The Way

The Federal Government Economic Impact Payment should start arriving soon. They will be sent out in 3 different waves. The <u>1st wave</u> will be by automatic deposit, arriving the week of April 13th, into the bank account of taxpayers for whom the IRS already has their banking information and also Social Security beneficiaries who filed federal tax returns that included direct deposit information. For security reasons, the **IRS plans to mail a letter** about the payment to the taxpayer's last known address within 15 days after the payment is paid. The letter will provide information on how the payment was made and how to report any failure to receive the payment. The <u>2nd wave</u> of payments could begin as early as the week of April 20th for people who receive Social Security benefits by direct deposit but do not make enough money to be required to file a federal income tax return in 2018 or 2019. The <u>3rd wave</u> will involve mailing an actual stimulus check. The paper checks themselves would be staggered over several weeks possibly beginning in early May.

The quickest way to receive your stimulus money is for the IRS to have your bank account information for direct deposit. The Treasury Department has launched a web-based portal to allow nonfilers to provide their direct deposit information and the "Get My Payment" application so tax filers can check the status of your direct deposit, verify your payment type as direct deposit or check, or provide direct deposit banking information if the payment has not been sent yet. U.S. residents will receive a non-taxable payment of \$1,200 for individual or head of household filers and \$2,400 for married filing jointly if they are not a dependent of another taxpayer and have a work eligible Social Security number with adjusted gross income up to \$75,000 for individuals, \$112,500 for head of household filers, and \$150,000 for married couples filing jointly. In addition, they are eligible for \$500 per qualifying child. Taxpayers with higher AGI's will receive a reduced payment and high-income filers will not qualify for a payment. There are some exclusions such as those who can be claimed as a dependent on someone else's return, those without a valid SS #, non-resident aliens, etc. Basically for persons who file a tax return, there will be no action required on your part to initiate this payment. The IRS cautions taxpayers to be on the lookout for payment scams during this time.

Manufacturing Jobs Available

Local Food Pantry

For those who have been hit extremely hard financially and may be experiencing food insecurity at this time, Calvary Episcopal Church, at 2840 Hendersonville Road, operates a food pantry on Saturday mornings from 8:00-11:00 am. It is located in the building behind the main church and can be accessed from their 2nd entrance from Old Airport Road. There is no cost for the pre-packaged food box which will be loaded into your car.

Using Facemasks & Gloves

The CDC now recommends wearing facemasks outside your home where social distancing is difficult to maintain (ex: grocery stores, pharmacies, etc.) and in areas of community-based transmission to help slow the spread of the virus and to help people who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others.

There a few reminders however: 1) A facemask does not negate the need to social distance; 2) the public should use <u>fabric masks</u> which can be made by a sew or non-sew method found at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/</u>2019-ncov/prevent-getting-sick/diy-cloth-face-coverings.html rather than trying to secure surgical masks or N-95 respirators which should be left for medical personnel and first responders.

Gloves are good to use outside the home or if caring for someone that is sick but just remember, gloves only protect <u>your</u> hands. You can still touch something with the virus on it and spread it everywhere you touch while wearing those same gloves. Also remember, you can still get the virus in your eyes even if you have on a mask and gloves -- so don't touch your eyes or face without washing your hands first.

Small Business Loans and Grants

The CARES Act is intended to assist business owners with current needs. There are several grants and loans that are a part of this program: (1) Paycheck Protection Program (PPP), which provides 100% federally guaranteed loans to small businesses. These loans may be forgiven if borrowers maintain their payrolls during the crisis or restore their payrolls afterward. (2) Small Business Debt Relief Program will provide immediate relief to small businesses with non-disaster SBA loans. Under it, the SBA will cover all loan payments including principal, interest, and fees, for six months. (3) Economic Injury Disaster Loans & Emergency Economic Injury Grants provide an emergency advance of up to \$10,000 to small businesses and private non-profits harmed by COVID-19 within three days of applying for an SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan. There are also several tax provisions available to small businesses due to the COVID-19 hardship. Please refer to the <u>US Chamber Guide</u> or the <u>US Senate Committee on Small Business & Entrepreneurship Guide</u> to determine what the CARES Act means for your business.

NC COVID-19 Rapid Recovery Lending Program

A consortium of public, private, and nonprofit partners have come together and launched an innovative recovery-lending program to help support NC small businesses and family farms bridge the gap between when crisis strikes and when federal loans, insurance payouts, and other relief funds are approved, or businesses have time to recover.
